## A Rocha International Leaders' Forum in Portugal



In June, the A Rocha Forum in Portugal brought together team leaders from around the world for an inspiring week. The theme was 'Sharing our stories', through workshops, songs, conversations, photos and videos. Each team also displayed a poster describing one of their projects. Because A Rocha is a distinctively Christian organization, time was spent God and praying together, worshipping considering how our faith and commitments shape A Rocha's direction and growth. This was the first Forum since A Rocha started in

Australia. Directors Anna and Stuart were there to meet and benefit from the experience of leaders from other countries and to provide detailed reports to our board to consider. Here are some of their reflections:

**Stuart**: The theme was 'Generosity' in response to God's generosity towards us, including in his Creation. I had a great time!

I felt encouraged and loved, gave encouragement, learnt a lot, developed some good relationships and ideas for partnerships, and came home thinking I want to continue helping grow A Rocha Australia.

The Forum attracted approximately 80 participants from across 18 A Rocha National Organisations and developing initiatives, all ARI staff, many ARI Trustees and a couple of projects (Eden Care, Nigeria; Eco Church, ARUK).

Probably my favourite part of the day was the Anr shared worship service followed by a talk by one

of the participants (which reflected the wealth of experience within AR globally). Worship was culturally diverse, sometimes in languages other than English, a great display of our unity in God.

**Anna:** "The A Rocha Forum was, for me, an incredibly encouraging time and I walked away feeling inspired and rather challenged. My favourite times were the conversations with other A Rocha people where they shared their own A Rocha stories. It is so wonderful to hear what God has been doing through A Rocha across the world."



Stuart: "The coast is reminiscent of southern Australian seascapes. Very often windy too. Peregrine Falcon nesting in cliffs. Yellow legged seagulls similar to Silver Gulls, but larger. Cold water, nice swells. Interestingly Eucalypts and Acacias were everywhere, felt like home. Everyone kept telling me how bad they are as weeds, and fuel bad wildfires, so I kept apologizing".

#### South Australian visit to Aldinga Washpool, 27 July

Aldinga Washpool is one of the few remaining coastal freshwater and estuarine lagoon systems along the Adelaide metropolitan coast, and provides significant habitat, biodiversity, cultural and spiritual values. This area has had, and continues to have, a significance and involvement for the local Kaurna people (the site is known as Wakondilla), including the Tjirbruki Dreaming story. The Washpool also has a long history of both state government and community action.



A Rocha South Australia friends were invited to visit and hear about the history and present situation of the Washpool. It is currently under varying tenure with a variety of historical land use (always though being Kaurna land). The 2018 revegetation plan "seeks to define and consolidate these areas with a goal to enhance and restore the structural vegetation communities present". Detailed botanical, ecological and environmental assessments within and surrounding the study area have already been undertaken which are providing up-to-date

data on site vegetation communities and location. There may be opportunities for A Rocha to assist here in the future.





We enjoyed a beautiful warm sunny afternoon visit to the Aldinga Washpool, but were sad to see a lack of water, due to poor winter rains. There was some good rainfall during the week following our visit and the transformation was stunning

On 30 June A Rocha Australia partnered with Sheoak Hill Glenmore for a tree planting day. Sheoak Hill Glenmore is a project aiming to revegetate 552 ha of farmland to re-establish a bio-link between the Brisbane Ranges National Park and Werribee Gorge State Park. It's an important project with amazing potential and we were privileged to be involved – praise be to be to the God of regeneration and new life!! It was cold and wet but we had a great time.

Glenmore has box gum woodland and could support endangered birds such as Swift Parrot and mammals such as Brush-tailed Phascogale.

• 2 hours

- 1552 seedlings
- 15 pottiputkis
- 19 locally indigenous tree and shrub species
- 6.3 Degrees Celcius
- 4 mm rain
- 50+ people (hard to get an exact number with all the kids running around...)

God bless the trees we planted.

May their roots grow deep and their trucks grow strong. May they avoid drought or pest or damage. May they flourish in the sunshine and in the rain. May they grow to absorb lots of carbon and provide homes to many generations of birds and possums.
